JEWELRY

Hello and happy new year Riverside!

We hope you and your family had a wonderful 2023 and that the new year will bring many blessings.

Time flew by so fast after our last visit! We are excited to be headed your way soon for our first 2024 show in Riverside, CA. With an overstuffed inventory, you are sure to find beautiful works that are perfect for treating yourself or getting a head start on a year's worth of gifts.

For this show there are so many new necklaces, including a huge variety of short Santo Domingo and turquoise necklaces which can be worn alone or paired with a pendant, as well as plenty of earrings, rings, bracelets

and more. We kept Hopi artist Darren Seweyestewa busy creating a huge variety of his silver overlay earrings and rings in all sizes. If you haven't seen Darren's work, you're in for a treat. It's textbook definition of traditional Hopi overlay style jewelry, and his pieces are absolute perfection for an excellent price. We have lots of beautiful new Santo Domingo jewelry in shell, turquoise and all the colors of spiny oyster shell (orange, red and purple) including new, colorful earrings by Daniel Coriz. We also have new colorful bead necklaces by Alexandria Coriz. For Alton fans - he made two impressive pendants in peanut jasper and White Buffalo as well as some long necklaces. He is currently working on more pieces we are hoping to have by show time. We will also have more sugilite pieces being made which will most likely be for the fall show. As you know, sugilite is becoming very rare and expensive so when we find good stones at reasonable prices, we snap them up. This makes for excellent opportunities to add to your collection at prices you won't find elsewhere. We also obtained more wonderful rings, pendants, and earrings with much-sought-after White Buffalo, including large gorgeous White Buffalo necklace and earring set.

We really went all out on restocking for this show series, including additions during our travels. We wanted to be sure to have a fantastic selection of jewelry for this show. Well, as luck would have it, we blew the doors off that goal!! At every show of our last series in 2023 we took in two to four new collections of jewelry. We also took in some extremely sought after (museum worthy) pottery and baskets. Work is always ongoing with regards to cleaning, restoring, and preparing these beautiful vintage pieces for sale. And yes, there are even more clip earrings for our clip earrings fans. Although not as popular today as "way back when" there are still those of you out there who seek out these hard-to-find treasures, and we are happy to find them for you. We have been burning the midnight oil as usual to bring the most fabulous jewelry and collector pieces to you! To mention a few of the pieces just in - there are two 14k gold and silver Vernon Haskie bracelets, a silver Vernon Haskie bracelet with highly sought after #8 turquoise, and an early tufa cast and turquoise bracelet. There is a sugilite bracelet and an inlay lapis ring by ultra-famous Navajo artist Gibson Nez and an incredible lapis bracelet by top-level Hopi artist Phil Poseyesva. There is a beautiful Lapis Ring and Bracelet set by Navajo artist Jerry Nelson as well. As for necklaces - we have a colorful inlay humming bird necklace by Dale Edaakie (this is a great example of his expert level work), an inlay bird necklace by **Raymond Boyd** and an unbelievable Zuni humming bird fetish necklace carved from amber by **Lena Boone**. We also have a double strand carved Jet and silver Lena Boone bear fetish necklace. There is a spectacular hand stamped sterling silver and Royston turquoise concho belt. It is amazing the sheer amount of vintage and highly collectible pieces added to our inventory from private collections.



Honestly, more vintage, high-end pieces than we've have in a long time. There are lots of wonderful treasures to see.

Amber in a notable quantity is another recent addition to our inventory. While not Native made, we have found that Polish and Lithuania made amber jewelry is a big hit and want to continue to provide that line of jewelry. In the last few years, we established some great connections and have been buying ever since. So many unique items in fabulous Baltic amber and sterling silver – pins, pendants, earrings and more! You will still find, however, some Native American jewelry that incorporates amber and Tamara's inventory has a bracelet with some amber as well.

For fans of *Alton Bedonie's* top-level work, check out his creations -two fabulously long necklaces with orange and reddish spiny oyster shell, two gorgeous sterling silver and lapis necklaces, four turquoise pendants and some ladies' turquoise rings and a new style of turquoise ring he came up with. Alton also made two beautiful bracelet and ring sets: one with Bisbee turquoise and the other with Lone Mountain turquoise as well as four new pairs of all-silver earrings. *Kee Yazzie* created a bracelet and pair of earrings which feature his petroglyph style design and four pendants (one with lapis and three with very nice turquoise cabochons).

Tamara continued her silversmithing activities at a furious pace to add more items to her Argentium inventory. Time has been tight, but despite the challenges there are still great pieces to be had. Included in her collection are earrings and several rings, a heavy and intricate necklace in what she calls "ancient Rome" style. As we go to press she is finishing up some labradorite earrings to match a pendant and hopes to have another pendant or two before show time. Work is neverending, so stay tuned for more items in the future!

If you like pins, pendants, and rings we restocked there as well. We found quite a few all-silver bracelets by Navajo artist *Tom Hawk, Leonard Nez, Albert Jake*, and the *Tahe* family. A few have over-the-top impressive stamp work on them. We were sure to stock up on the Tahe stamped "kite" style earrings which are very popular and sell out quick, as well as the *Pauline Armstrong* earrings with dangles. The *Tahi's* also recently introduced three new styles of stamped, curved earrings, and we also found some new *Pauline Armstrong* earrings with angel skin coral. All are light weight and easy-breezy to wear! They make such great gifts; we can't get enough! There are several new Hopi bracelets as well as Hopi earrings and Pendants. We also have money clips and key rings, all of which make nice affordable gifts.

On a sad note, it was confirmed that Zuni artist *Nancy Laconsello* passed away (almost two years ago now), and *Ruddell* sustained an eye injury that left him unable to work. This award-winning team is famous for their intricate and detailed inlay work (usually of birds) in mirror-finish silver. It is truly a bitter loss for the world of Native American jewelry. We currently have some fine pieces by *Ruddell* and *Nancy*, but once they are gone any new items can only be obtained from fast-dwindling stock at trading posts as well as private collections.

We were also just informed in mid-February (2024) that Navajo artist *Ron Bedonie* passed away recently as well. Another huge loss for the family and the art world.

We have, by far, the largest collection of concho belts that we have ever had. We just added two more: a Navajo hand stamped sterling silver and Royston turquoise belt; a Zuni inlay link belt by *Raymond Boyd* with half dollar size conchos and a Navajo concho belt on leather with beautiful large Royston turquoise stones by *Dean Sandoval*.

At the end of our last show series we acquired a silver, gold, and Continued on page 2 ➤ turquoise ring by Arland Ben, a Hopi bracelet by Bradley Gashwazra, several Hopi bolo ties, and a very nice heavy turquoise bracelet made with coin silver. There is a collection of buckles which includes pieces by Tom Jim and Eugene Mitchell. All we can say is "wow"! There are collector-quality pieces from some of the top Navajo, Zuni, and Hopi artists to ever make jewelry including a very rare bolo tie by legendary Zuni artist Frank Vacit. In these collections there are also rings, earrings, pins, pendants, bracelets, bolos, and necklaces ranging in dates from the 1930's to almost present day. This is by far the largest selection of rare and vintage jewelry we have had in a very long time. You will not want to miss this show. Bring your wish list!

If there is something you are specifically looking for, please be sure to ask. This show will truly be a treat for the eyes!

In all, this is one of the largest collections we have ever had at one time. The range of spectacular jewelry is huge! It includes works by artists such as Donnie Supplee, Lee Yazzie, Vernon Haskie, Edison Cummings, Howard Nelson, Carl and Irene Clark, Ervin Haskie, Harlan and Monica Coonsis, Lavina Tsikewa, Ruddell and Nancy Laconsello, Bradley Gashwazra, Arland Ben, Calvin Begay and many more.

There's not enough room in this newsletter to describe everything, so here is a brief listing of some of the artists:

Bracelets by: Phillip Sekaquaptewa, Alvin and Lula Begay, Cecil Ashley, Alvin Tso, Ronald Wadsworth and more.

Other award-winning artists' works include: Charles Supplee, Donnie Supplee, Sherian Honhongva, Daniel Coriz, Chris Nieto, Nelson Begay, Michael Garcia, Olivia Whitethorn, Dina Huntinghorse and Duane Maktima.

If you can' make it to the show or if you remember another special someone for whom you need a gift, keep in mind that we now conduct two Facebook Live sales per year. CARVINGS, POTTERY, RUGS, S&NDP&INTINGS &ND MORE

We restocked our Navajo sand painting boxes and our framed sand painting selection. The new designs are gorgeous! Sandpainting boxes and framed sand paintings all make great gifts!







Recently we have taken in a good amount of older Puebloan pots. A few of these pieces are 30 to 40 year-old Hopi pieces, to include a short Joy Navasie polychrome vase. From the same collection is a carved black slip Santa Claran Margaret Tafoya bowl. In the later part of last year a few of the New Mexico pueblos lifted their covid admittance restrictions which should result in more pottery being made. I chatted with two contacts in New Mexico and we should begin to see some great new pieces from Acoma, Jemez and possibly Zuni. These new pots will add to the excellent selection of older Navajo wedding baskets that were brought in over the holidays.

As for Zuni fetish carvings, we have a great collection of about forty-five pieces, so there are lots of items from which to shop. Many of these carvings are by well-known, award-winning artists

and are crafted from an assortment of stones and organic material. And remember, fetishes are not just for table-top display; be sure to check out the jewelry sections as we also have some fabulous animal and bird fetish necklaces.

We just took in several collections containing some highly sought after pieces to include: a Margaret and Luther Gutierrez Santa Clara fetish style necklace and earrings with turtles, two Teresa Salvador polychrome flower pattern pots, a story teller and an owl vase by Margaret Gutierrez. There are two incredible baskets that came in; one is a first/second mesa Hopi plaque with a bird pattern ca. 1970-1980 and the other is a museum quality 1910 -1920 Apache basket.

Our pottery inventory is impressive, with a large selection on hand. All our pieces are from the Southwest, ranging from hand etched, air brushed Navajo pots to natural clay that is hand coiled, stone polished and fired outdoors. A great example of these latter pots is the Mata Ortiz pieces. Many of these pieces have complex, fine-line detail artwork and are hand-coiled. Some have detailed geometric relief patterns and others have very detailed carvings. We restocked this year with a HUGE selection of these fabulous works of art.

The village of Mata Ortiz traces its origins to those of the Mogollon Culture. These early Native Americans existed at the same time as the more well-known Anasazi and the lesser-known Hohokam. All three of these cultures based their livelihoods around farming. It was the development clay vessel crafting that helped these early Native American communities to not only transport water from springs, creeks, and rivers, but allowed them to securely store their vital seed supplies between each harvest and the next planting season.

With time, these simple, utilitarian vessels became more ornate and decorative. Nowadays some of the finest, most detailed pots are from this region. The price for this quality of work is incredible!

In Navajo and Jemez pottery, we have a nice selection of new Navajo hand etched pots and some wonderful hand-made Jemez Pueblo spiral melon pieces. There are also a couple of wonderful storyteller pots from the Lucero family on Jemez.

Our impressive kachina collection continues to dazzle with an inventory that includes work from award winning artists such as Laurence Dallas, Keith Torres, Raymond Chee, Marlin Pinto, and Sterling McRae.

There will be something in everyone's price range, so be sure to stop by and see us!
